"Breaking the Silence"

Last month, in August, our Ichi-mi group hosted another successful seminar. This last seminar was titled, "Breaking the Silence." This seminar was meant as a follow-up to the previous seminar that

was titled, "A Profound Silence." Because Ichimi is a Jodo Shinshu group, one that is named after a phrase found in the Shoshin Nenbutsuge, "profound silence" may sound like it was meant to have a positive connotation. Unfortunately, the "profound" in "profound silence" was meant to highlight the tremendous negative impact that not recognizing, and not speaking about the prejudice that the LGBTQIA+ community has to confront has on the lives of the members of those communities, even within our temples.

Whereas religion talks about universals, it also has its focus on human lives. If religion cannot help individuals discover meaning in their lives, then there really is no point in having religion. Perhaps this is the main reason why religious attendance appears to be dropping: fewer people appear to be looking towards religion to help them find meaning. According to a 2023

Gallup poll¹, about three in four Americans identify with a religious faith. On the other hand, the same poll indicated that 45% of Americans stated that religion is "very important" in their lives, 26% stated that religion is "fairly important" and 28% said "not very important." This can be compared to data from 2020, when 48% answered "very important," 25% answered "fairly important," and 27% answered "not very important." Comparing this with data taken 10 years earlier in 2010, 54% of Americans answered "very important," 26% stated "fairly important" and 20% said "not very important." During the same period, in 2023, 32% of adults said that they had gone to a religious institution within the past seven days. In 2020 that number was 30%, and in 2010, the number was 39%. Gallup also reported that in "2000, 44% had gone to church in the past seven days, and in 1958, 49% had."² In other words, the numbers do not look good.

I believe that one possible reason why younger Americans, in particular, have stopped going to church (meaning any house of worship) is because the universal message of religion is

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being lost in our "separateness." I doubt that many would disagree with me when I say that we, as Americans, are more divided than ever. For example, politically, we have always had a two party system. Unfortunately, it seems that now-instead of being a reason for discourseour political affiliation has become a reason for mistrust and enmity. Our current political landscape has our leaders openly talking about deliberately redistricting voting jurisdictions for the reason of political (party) gain. In the past, at least there was the presumption that redistricting was done to make the new district better represent the electorate. It also probably doesn't help when churches now appear to be choosing political sides when we are so politically divided as a nation. Within all these divides, political and social, it has clearly become "us" versus "them."

Hopefully, religion and religious institutions can re-focus again on universals while it focuses on human lives. In Jodo Shinshu, one of the universals that is expressed is through the phrase "grasped, never to be abandoned" or sesshu fusha (摂取不捨). It is such an important phrase that it appears almost immediately in the Kyogyoshinsho³. Unfortunately, we also haven't been doing such a good job at expressing this universal when it comes to


embracing our LGBTQIA+ members. In terms of "grasped, never to be abandoned," it was mentioned at the "Breaking the Silence" seminar that if being LGBTQIA+ is neither supported nor recognized then this does not allow a person to feel "grasped," even if they have "not been abandoned." This revelation really opened my eyes to the depth and breadth of the universal nature of "grasped, never to be abandoned" or sesshu fusha. Fortunately, we have been getting better at supporting and recognizing people for who they are, especially as we teach each other the universal qualities of Jodo Shinshu or the religious truths and the tradition that we share. Hopefully, this will motivate us to do more, because there is still a lot more to do.

- Sending to us your company's corporate giving contact information (i.e. Name, title and
 physical address; also helpful are email address and/or phone number). We will respectfully
 make contact with a formal donation request letter and brochure of our project.
- And for those of us who are over 70 ½ years old, a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) allows individuals to make tax-free donations directly from their Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs). QCDs can be used to fulfill your Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs)

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without adding to your taxable income. This is especially beneficial for individuals aged 73 or older. Unlike standard charitable deductions, you can benefit from a QCD even if you don't itemize deductions on your tax return. But the funds cannot pass through your hands; they must be sent directly from your IRA administrator to the charity. So, if you are considering this option, please contact your IRA administrator.



As we move into September and the observance of Ohigan, I'm reminded of one of the fundamental truths of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism: Impermanence. While change can sometimes feel tough, we learn that impermanence helps us let go of clinging to what is temporary and instead find genuine joy in the present moment. I've been thinking about this a lot lately, as I prepare for a backpacking trip where I'll be carrying everything I need to survive (albeit comfortably) for a 4-day trip. It's a personal way for me to embrace impermanence, shedding excess, learning to adapt, and finding balance between necessity, comfort, and weight. I encourage you to do the same by intentionally altering a small part of your routine. By doing so, we make more space for new possibilities and personal growth in your life and those around you.

A Metamorphosis for Our Social Hall

Speaking of impermanence, the principle of change is now very visible right here at our temple as we begin our Social Hall refurbishment project. We've officially started demolition and construction! Much like a caterpillar entering a metamorphosis, our Social Hall is now surrounded by construction fencing and internal changes are well underway. This is a clear sign that our vision for a renewed and vibrant space is becoming a reality.

I amnpleased to share that our fundraising campaign is progressing. We have reached 25% of our \$2 million goal, which is a significant milestone, but we still have a long way to go, with \$1.5 million still needed to complete this large-scale project. To make it easier for everyone to contribute, we have set up a convenient and flexible payment process. You can make a pledge of any amount—whether it's \$100, \$500, \$1000, or more—to be automatically billed monthly, quarterly, or yearly to your credit card. 2025 Jr YBA Trip to Japan

This past June, members of the Gardena Junior YBA and their families had the opportunity to visit Japan on a religious and personal endeavor. This trip took 2 years of planning and fundraising. It all started back in 2019, when my son Brenden and the rest of the Sangha Teens were thinking about restarting the Sangha Teen Hawaii trip. Unfortunately, Covid was upon us in 2020 and all plans were scrapped. Fast forward to fall of 2023, where in my mind I wanted the Junior Y to have an opportunity to travel whether it be Hawaii or Japan. In speaking with Junior Y members and their parents, Japan was the consensus. My initial idea was sort of personal, as a reward for the Class of 2025 graduates, which included my son. We opened it up to all those in Jr. Y from the Class of 2024 all the way to the Class of 2028, as long as you participated in the fundraising to help subsidize the Juniors cost. 10 total Junior Y members along with their family members signed up for the trip. We had a total of 34 in the travel party. This was a special trip, as aside from parents and siblings, we had cousins, aunts, uncles and grandparents also along for the trip. We started our fundraising in July of 2024 with a church wide recycle drive and concluded the fundraising in April 2025. In between we receive donations from the Gardena BWA and individuals along with a Spaghetti/Bingo fundraiser, more recycle drives and a Boba fundraiser. The Junior Y is forever grateful for everyone's support.

We ended up working with Kintetsu International to help us with our trip planning since they have worked with our BWA, OCBC and Yonsei. Coming up with the dates were a little challenging due to the 2025 academic year endings, Wisteria Chugakko, Saishin Dojo, student's summer schedules and obons. We ended up choosing mid-June through July 1 with the first part of the trip in Kyoto and second half of our trip was spent in Tokyo.

The Kyoto portion of the trip was jam packed starting from the first full day. We started our first full day with a 6AM service at Nishi Howngwanji followed by the Kikyoshiki Ceremony (Buddhist Name) which was presented by the Gomonshu Emeritus and culminating in a tour of Nishi Hongwanji. After a quick trip back to the Miyako Hachijo Hotel for breakfast, we visited Sanju Sangendo, Ohtani Hombyo and Kiyomizu Temple. Lastly, after 10s of thousand steps, our day ended with a welcome shabu shabu group dinner.



Day 2 we visited Fushimi Inari in the morning and we went to Todaji Temple and Nara Deer Park in the afternoon. The third day we spent in Osaka with a trip to the Nissin Cup Noodle Factory where we created our very own Cup of Noodle, a quick lunch trip to Dotonbori and ending our day at Osaka Castle.

Our 4th day we visited Hiroshima and Miyajima Island where we visited Itsukushima Shrine and had lunch and time to explore the island. In Hiroshima we visited Peace Memorial Park and Museum. This was a somber moment and gave us a moment to reflect on the horrors of war. It was a little more personal for my wife Amy as her mom lived in Hiroshima before the bomb was dropped. Thankfully, she moved just prior to the bomb. Our Hiroshima trip concluded with a group Hiroshima Okonomiyaki dinner.

We had a free day on the 5th day. Some families went to explore Kyoto more, some families took (Continued on page 12)

Day 6 we departed Kyoto for Tokyo. We had a relaxing Shinkansen ride to Tokyo. Upon arriving in Tokyo we had a tour of Asakusa and Tokyo Skytree before checking into the Keio Plaza Hotel in Shinjuku.

In Tokyo, every family was free to explore on their own. Day 7 most families went to Tokyo Disney Sea and those who didn't go went to Yokohama.

On our 8th day, Friday, we went to Tokyo Dome to watch the Tokyo Giants play the Yokohama DeNA Bay Stars. Everyone who attended had a blast. The food was amazing and the atmosphere of the supporters for both teams was off the chart.



Days 9-12 was more of personal sightseeing. Some families went home on day 9 and the rest extended their stay an additional 3 days in Tokyo. 


